Reflection Questions

- b) How could you use the principles of intersectionality in teaching to account for diverse social identities of students?
- c) What specific example from your field would you use to illustrate how feminist pedagogy changes the view on traditional knowledge?
- d) How can you support dialogue and participation from students to make the classroom a place of productive conflict, rather than just a safe space?
